

## Theme & Supporting Details



Introduction In The Sea Devil, the reader sits at the dock's edge, hanging on to every detail. In fact, it is the details which create the

sense of realism in the story. The primary theme is man's struggle with nature—a life-and-death one, here. Another theme is the physical idleness of modern times. A third idea is the distancing from—yet the pull towards—survival behaviors, such as hunting and fishing. The supporting details for each of these ideas draw the reader in.



<u>Directions</u> Choose two themes from The Sea Devil. Identify one theme in each of the boxes on the left. In the oblongs on the right, list

three supporting details for each of the main ideas. For example, for man's struggle with nature, your details could include the mullet's not taking the hook, or the protagonist's making certain no stingray is hidden in the mesh. For physical idleness, examples are: the man not having to fish for food and his working with his head, not his hands.
